

SIEC and Co-Bank award \$10,000 to Davis County Historical Society through matching grant program

Co-Bank's Sharing Success matching grant program is designed to celebrate the vital role that cooperatives play in the U.S. rural economy and in individual communities across the country. Co-Bank has committed \$3 million in 2016 to match donations by cooperative partnerships through nonprofit organizations in their local communities. Contributions are matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis, up to \$5,000.

The matching funds were a community investment by Southern Iowa Electric Cooperative, Inc. This is the 5th year in a row that SIEC has been able to capture the Co-Bank grant

funds for projects in our local area. This year's \$10,000 grant will help the Davis County Historical Society with its restoration of the Historic Findley House.

SIEC works hard not only to provide value to our members, but also to improve the quality of life in the communities we serve. Previous recipients of Co-Bank's matching grant program were Moulton EMS and Fire Department, Van Buren County Trails, Davis County Trails Association and Camp Wapello Preservation Group. We're delighted to team up with Co-Bank in support of such worthy causes. ⚡

Lineman completes comprehensive 4-year training program

SIEC lineman Anthony Ondriska has successfully completed one of the world's most comprehensive training programs for power line personnel. The Merchant Job Training & Safety Program (MJTS) is available to line personnel in 40 states and is administered through computers and fax machines for immediate response – including assistance through a website.

Each utility has an acting training coordinator who assists the co-op's trainees by administering "closed book" testing. The coordinators manage their own people throughout the educational process from rules set by the MJTS and the statewide electric cooperative association.

"The flashlight's dead! Where are the batteries? What about the candles?"

The next time you need an emergency light, you won't have to utter any of those words, because the Eton Blackout Buddy H₂O from the American Red Cross doesn't need batteries. It doesn't have a hand crank either. Instead, it runs on a little bit of water!

All you do is dip the Blackout Buddy H₂O in a small cup of water to activate it and light the way. Then add water once a day to keep the light shining for up to 72 continuous hours. After that, dispose of the light in your regular trash; there are no environmental issues, because the unit's power module is free from all the nasty stuff you'd find in normal batteries, such as mercury, hexavalent chromium, cadmium and lead.

You can store the 2.6-inch-tall, lightweight Blackout Buddy H₂O for up to 10 years without degradation. Suggested retail price is about \$10 (plus shipping) from the American Red Cross Store at www.redcrossstore.org. ⚡

The life expectancy of a photovoltaic (PV) system depends not just on the solar panels, but on the inverter as well. PV panels have a life expectancy of about 30 years. However, the power rating of PV modules tends to degrade slowly over time, due to such factors as higher temperatures and the aging of materials.

For crystalline silicon panels, the loss in power ranges from 0.5 percent to 1.0 percent a year. Inverters have a life expectancy of approximately 15 years, but in some cases, they'll need to be repaired or replaced sooner.

Keep equipment far away from **OVERHEAD POWER LINES.**

If your equipment makes contact with a power line:

- Stay on the equipment unless, in a very rare case, it's on fire.
- Call emergency and utility services.
- Warn others to stay away.
- Do not leave equipment until a utility professional has told you it is safe to do so.
- If equipment is on fire, jump clear of it with your feet together and without touching the vehicle and ground at the same time. Continue to "bunny hop" with your feet together to safety.

Safety Matters

Are your grain bins ready for harvest?

Harvest season is fast approaching and SIEC strongly encourages you or your electrician to check your grain bin electrical services before harvest season to be sure they're in proper working order.

Planning ahead will help eliminate delays during the harvest. Please contact the cooperative to schedule any assistance you or your electrician need in getting your equipment ready.

Always be aware of overhead lines when working around grain bins. Have a safe harvest season!
